SEASON 2017 - WHAT WILL IT BRING?

In this article I will tell you what I have done until now and what I am planning until the first marathon race St Vincent, the start of the marathon season.

What is behind us...

I mated the breeders one month later than I always have done. The reason is just practical. The youngsters from the breeders go into their youngster section. But in this section are the hens of the racers during the winter. So with postponing the mating of the breeders I can also mate the racers one month later. Because I race them on the Natural system, I hope that the racers will keep their feathers also a bit longer. In 2016 I was not able to basket them all for the last races due to this.

Before the mating of the breeders I handled all pigeons, did some checks on their condition and gave them a drop against parasites.

So I mated the breeders in the last week of January 2017. This was the first time for me. Normally it was during the Christmas period that I mated them and it was a bit uncomfortable for me during that period.

Ten couples of breeders were mated and it went smoothly. Only one egg not filled and one pair of eggs being destroyed by the cock. They got the standard cure against trichomoniasis when they were breeding on their first eggs.

At the end of February, beginning of March I started with releasing the racers again. They were locked in the loft the whole period of the wintertime. So from the end of October until end of February. The conditions must be OK and I must have the time to let them out. Working 40 hours a week and pigeons during the wintertime is not a good combo. So lights on, feeding and lights out again.

During the second week of March I was on vacation with my wife and after that week I just opened the door between the hens and the cocks and opened the nest boxes. After two days I did some inventory and after again two days I did inventory number two. Of the 18 nestboxes, 14 were filled and in four was a cock but no hen. So I mated these last four and I moved the hens that were left back to the young bird loft.

During this process I tried to release the birds as much as possible, so that they could enjoy the mated life in freedom.

The racers also got the standard cure against trichomoniasis when almost all of them were on their first eggs. When I was

able to see if the eggs were filled, I moved them around so that I had at least one egg that was able to hatch for all of the race couples. So every couple was able to raise a youngster. I think this is good for the racers to get a feeling with the loft and know that they need to go home to the nest where they have had a youngster. Once they were breeding, I moved the single hens to the racing loft. So when a hen does not come home they can take their place.

After the clock moved at the end of March I started training the racers every day. And after two weeks I started with a toss on 12 kilometers, after that 25 kilometers twice.

club with the races on the second long distance race of Vierzon 600 kilometers. This only for the yearling racers. The two year olds and older birds will be on the one night transport only. This in view of the Natural system.

The yearlings will get two or three long distance races including the National race from Chateauroux. I believe in the learning effect of a National release of about 40,000-60,000 pigeons and that they need to find the way themselves.

The old birds will be on about 10 day old eggs when basketing for St Vincent and 17 day old eggs for basketing for the second



Then they went three times to Roosendaal, 115 kilometers. Previous week they got Asse/Zelik 185 kilometers and the following week they will get Roye 345 kilometers.

What is in store for the racers...

So after this week they will have about 935 kilometers done. The aim is to get them to 1,500 kilometers before the big races start. These are all training tosses. Organized by our province North-Holland alone or with the province of South-Holland. So no races with the club. I will step into the schedule of the

race Bordeaux. After the first two races I will make the planning for the rest of the season.

What can go wrong...

First of all of course the weather. Previous weekend we had 30 degrees, south eastern winds and clear skies, but on the edge of bad weather. That was not a good combo for the pigeons. Fortunately I was still with the training tosses, so I was able to avoid this weekend. The opposite is just rainy, cold weather. I can still happen of course, although June is approaching.

Secondly a very bad race. So lots of pigeons lost or that come home and need a lot of time to recuperate. This is always disappointing, but you must give them this time and toss them a few times on a small distance of 25-40 miles to test them and give them confidence again. And try to find the cause of failure. Maybe an illness, lack of motivation or even lack of quality. Check also the results and findings of your fellow fanciers on the same race. Maybe you can come to a conclusion together.

Thirdly there are always surprises during a season. A pigeon fancier must adjust to these and be creative. But try to put the pigeons first in these decisions and not

championships or goals set during the winter.

Tips and tricks...

Keep a diary. Write down what you do, what happened and you can also keep track on positions, the order of returning and other trivial stuff. And the fun part is that you can look back in time and check what you did a year back, or four years back.

When you choose for a system, believe in it and do change this every month. So when you planned to race Natural, do that and do not switch. When you planned to feed them a mix of grain, stick to it. Or when you have decided to do something on a certain date,

do it. Stick to your plans. Enjoy the fun moments, because normally speaking there are not that many. And when you write about it, you can relive these later!

When you are good with Excel and Word, make a plan in Excel for the pigeons. I have a list of the pigeons and the races that are available. I mark them when they are basketed and I also make a note of the order of returning. Doing this I can look back, make a calculation of the number of kilometers or miles flown and I can look back what the history of the pigeon is.

Have fun this season and I hope you will get some great results.
